




We have always been a theater company in love with words and the power they have to create images in our minds, evoke emotions in our hearts and put smiles on our faces. We've wooed them all: lonely words, well-known words, snippy four-letter words and multisyllabic polyphonemes.

A love story: For the past three years, we have thrown our hearts, souls, time and money into the **Vanguard Voices Project**, which we developed with the Dramatic Writing Program at SUNY New Paltz. The **VV Project** develops, in a workshop setting, the best plays written by SUNY students and alumni, and then performs them before a public audience and ultimately publishes them.

Last year, generous support from the SUNY Alumni Association and the English Department helped offset some losses arising from the publication of the finished scripts. The project was continued this year while we pursued additional sources of support within the college. While we have received encouragement from SUNY administrators, we have learned that underwriting assistance from the college is not possible, causing us to cancel (temporarily, we hope) the publication of this year's student work. While we may not be able to publish this year's scripts, we hope to keep the project – one we believe in wholeheartedly – alive.

# **Humble Boy**

By Charlotte Jones Another Hudson Valley Premiere Buzzes Straight to the Heart



Written in 2001, **Humble Boy** is a luminous, sad, funny play about Cambridge research fellow and astrophysicist Felix Humble, who returns home for his entomologist and bee-keeping Dad's funeral, only to find that his queen-bee mother Flora has her eye on George Pye, the next door neighbor. Angered by his mother's behavior, distressed by some shocking revelations and confused about his own future, Felix contemplates dissociation in a black hole and the best way "to do yourself in," until an angry bee and a knowledgeable gardener illuminate the situation and lead Felix to his own "Eureka Moment." It is about a mother-son relationship, a Cotswold garden, a Theory of Everything and beekeeping.

MMSC Producing Director Robert Miller notes, "Charlotte Jones has managed to create so many layers in this relatively simple story. Her dialogue is witty and sharp, but this is more than just a charmingly funny play. Jones is the kind of writer who can tie together bees, **Hamlet**, Isaac Newton, Stephen Hawking, the Garden of Eden, black holes, and a

garden party in which untoward incidents befall human remains. Jones has the skill to keep all of these balls in the air at once, metaphors within metaphors, cross-referenced, layers of wit that coalesce into Big Issues like love, death and immortality."

The cast features Sean Marrinan as Felix Humble, Christine Crawfis as Flora Humble, Elizabeth Barrows as Mercy Lott, Ron Schade as George Pye, Heather Berry as Rosie Pye, and William Connors as Jim, the Gardener.

British playwright Charlotte Jones received the People's Choice Best New Play Award, Critic's Circle Award for Best New Play and the Susan Smith Blackburn Award for **Humble Boy**. She is the author of six plays and has written the book for Andrew Lloyd Webber's new musical, an adaptation of Wilkie Collins' *The Woman in White*, that just opened in London's West End in September.

#### The Poetry of War - Nov. 5

Carnage on a monstrous scale is the inevitable outcome of war, yet poets are often born in battle. The poems in this program cover 600 years of war, from Henry IV to World War II. They were written by patriots, soldiers turned pacifists, impotent observers, and a nurse. There are a rare few written by women. Poets include Shakespeare, Tennyson, Hardy, Yeats, Sassoon, Owen, Auden, Whitman, Jarrell, Hecht, Eberhart, and McGinley.

## Three Viewings by Jeffrey Hatcher - Nov. 6

As in the HBO hit series, **Six Feet Under,** the three serio-comic monologues in **Three Viewings** take place in a funeral parlor. Performed separately, the three stories interweave to portray the deceased and the bereaved, and the lengths to which survivors will go to hold on to memories, money, life and love. *New York Magazine* wrote that **Three Viewings** is "essential viewing..." and *Variety* stated that the monologues are "...beautifully spun tales that have the cumulative impact - and surprise payoffs... of one of the season's small indisputable triumphs."

In 1999, MMSC presented the premiere of Barbara Adams' one-act play, **God's Lioness and the Crow: Sylvia Plath and Ted Hughes**, and so began a wonderful creative collaboration. Her numerous other creations for MMSC include an evening of Pulitzer Prize-winning poets and an MMSC's Tenth Anniversary Season program: **The Poetry of War** (see page 3, col. 1).

"Writing connects me to the world," Barbara says, and the publication of her most recent volume of poetry, *The Ordinary Living*, was a not-to-be-missed opportunity for MMSC to connect to Barbara with a program based on her intensely personal work. This program will evoke Adams' vivid voice and extensive range. Her writing arises from the "ordinary" events in a woman's life: love, marriage, parents, children, loss, work, joy, death, sexuality - the hallmarks of an identity that give life meaning.

Ms. Adams received her Ph.D. from NYU and she recently retired as Professor of English at Pace University in order to write full-time. She lives in Newburgh and she is the judge in this year's *Vanguard Voices of the Hudson Valley* poetry contest for MMSC.
