

Our Tenth Anniversary!



We are delighted to open MMSC's second decade with one of our most rewarding and worthwhile projects, The Vanguard Voices Project: Nurturing New Playwrights. This is the third year of our collaboration with the SUNY New Paltz Dramatic Writing Program to develop new plays written by talented SUNY students and alumni. We are proud that our partnership with the college continues to grow. This year the performances will take place at Parker Theater, on SUNY's campus, thanks to the generosity of the Theatre Department. This project has also received support from the English Department, the Office of Alumni Affairs and from Dean Gerald Benjamin of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

In addition to this inspiring program, we will follow Hamlet's dictum "the play's the thing" by offering five different dramatic works, including Arthur Miller's **The Price**, a brand new work (**Scrabble & Tabouli**) written by our own resident playwright, Laurence Carr, and the Hudson Valley premieres of three plays that even I had not heard of two months ago (**Humble Boy, Three Viewings** and **God's Man In Texas.**)

Lest we offend Terpsichore, Muse of Poetry and Dance, our season is filled with verse. We will be

Mountain Stage Company's Tenth Anniversary Celebration Fall Season will kick off with the Third Annual Vanguard Voices Project: Nurturing New Playwrights, MMSC's presentation of new plays by current and graduate students in the State University of New York at New

Paltz's Dramatic Writing Program on Saturday, September 11 at 8 PM and Sunday, September 12 at 2 PM at Parker Theatre on SUNY's New Paltz campus.

MMSC's unique **Vanguard Voices Project** will, for the third year in a row, provide an invaluable workshop and performance experience for emerging playwrights, as they develop their new plays in a nuturing environment. Working with Robert G. Miller, MMSC's Producing Director, and Laurence Carr, MMSC Playwright in Residence and Head of the SUNY New Paltz Dramatic Writing Program, four young playwrights were selected from the best of SUNY's Dramatic Writing classes. Each play was cast with a company of MMSC's most versatile actors, each was rehearsed and revised in this constructive workshop setting, and each will be premiered at Parker Theatre before eager MMSC audiences.

MMSC's mission is to provide a performance format for actors, directors, playwrights and audiences whose passions for theater and new work intersect. MMSC's Readers Theatre is a performance style where the "word," and all concomitant ideas, purposes, and realizations, become the sole focus. It is

a natural extension of MMSC's mission and performance style to support the **Vanguard Voices Project** which has been designed to nuture new playwrights and to provide a forum for these young writers who are creating theatrical, potent and entertaining new American stories.

The **Vanguard Voices Project** is also an opportunity for Hudson Valley audiences to experience the development of new theatrical work. Audiences will have the opportunity to hear new work from this group of playwrights who are at varying stages in their early careers. Taken as a whole, these works represent the diverse genres, cultures, and theatrical vocabularies of the American theater scene.

Selected for production in our **Vanguard Voices Project 2004** are:

- The Letters by Michael Bonet
- Minor Details by Eliza Murray
- Publisher's Block by Jamie Gerardi
- Marching Home Again by Christopher Dumm

Readers for **Vanguard Voices Project 2004** are: Heather Berry, Jack Harris, Jack Kroll, Laura Love Kroll, Sean Marrinan, RoseMarie Navarra, and Bruce Pileggi. All pieces will be directed by Robert G. Miller, with Laurence Carr serving as dramaturg for the project.

A vital part of the project will be the "Talk Back" session which will follow each performance; these young playwrights need to hear audience feedback. The process of writing a play or, indeed, becoming a good playwright is not an easy one and requires a nurturing atmosphere and the input of many "listeners" along the way.

Performances are Saturday, September 11 at 8 PM and Sunday, September 12 at 2 PM at SUNY's Parker Theatre on the SUNY Campus. Admission is \$10 for adults and \$5 for students with a valid ID. Reservations may be made by calling MMSC's offices at (845) 255-3102.

The publication of *The Ordinary Living*, Barbara Adams' most recent collection of poems, gives MMSC an opportunity to devote an entire evening to Adams' work: poetry, stories and essays published in magazines and anthologies since 1972. This program will evoke



Adams' vivid voice and extensive range. Adams' writing arises from the "ordinary" events in a woman's life: love, marriage, parents, children, loss, work, joy, death, sexuality - the hallmarks of an identity that give life meaning. No conflict, no story. Adams' persona struggles with an Irish-Jewish heritage, career v. family, selfishness and love's compromises. Stay tuned. Straight from the archives comes this wonderful program from MMSC's popular **Storied Word Series.** First performed in 1995, this evening of Henry James short stories formed the basis for many **Storied Word** programs to come.

American-born writer, gifted with talents in literature, psychology, and philosophy, Henry James wrote 20 novels, 112 stories, 12 plays as well as a number of literary criticism essays. His models were Dickens, Balzac, and Hawthorne.

Henry James was born in New York City into a wealthy family. His father was one of the best-known

intellectuals in mid-nineteenthcentury America, whose friends included Thoreau, Emerson and Hawthorne.

Returning to recreate their original renditions of two Henry James stories are Elizabeth Askue (reading *The Real Thing*) and Don Wildy (reading *The Pupil.*) Come and see how it all began.
